OFE Trustees, Staff Honor Emily Stratton as She Retires After 22 Years as Director Emily Stratton, the longest serving executive

director of the Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence. retired Sept. 30, capping off a 22-year tenure that expanded programs impacting countless Oklahoma public school students and teachers. The foundation's board and staff paid tribute

to Stratton at the Annual Board of Trustees meeting in September. "Emily Stratton has touched so many teachers, students and people's lives in her role as our executive director, and we are honored to celebrate her gifts and her legacy," said President Jami Rhoades Antonisse, a 1987 Academic All-State alumna.

Antonisse announced that the next two Academic All-Staters from Stratton's family home of Clinton will receive scholarships presented in her honor, as a gift from past foundation presidents. Stratton received an intricately designed, framed paper blossom, created by Trustee Farooq Karim using paper from foundation marketing materials. Staff and trustees also surprised Stratton with a photo book and video highlighting milestone moments in her OFE career.

"We are grateful for your grace, your kindness, your can-do spirit, your creativity, and your dedication to our mission and the growth of our programs," said OFE Communications Director Brenda Wheelock, reading from the book's dedication. "Thanks to your

leadership, countless students and teachers in Oklahoma have benefited from the work of our foundation, receiving opportunities for academic growth, professional development and recognition for academic

Stratton took the helm of the foundation in May 1999, but her involvement dates back to the foundation's beginnings when she was invited to serve as a founding trustee in 1986. During her tenure, the foundation has recognized 2,300 students as Academic All-Staters and 116 educators and educational programs as Medal for Excellence winners. In the past 22 years,

Grants for K-12 Mentoring Programs Offered

To better support the needs of Oklahoma mentoring organizations, the Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence is excited to announce a new funding opportunity: Boren Mentoring Initiative Grants.

For the inaugural year, grants will be awarded on a first-come, first-served basis for qualifying applicants. Grant applications and guidelines are available at www.ofe.org. Two categories of grants are available:

Startup Grants – Two startup grants of up to \$3,000 each will be available to new mentoring organizations in their first three years of operation. These grants are designed to encourage communities to start quality mentoring programs.

Opportunity Grants – Six opportunity grants of up to \$1,500 each will be available to existing mentoring groups to help fund programming,

training, materials or other programs that advance excellence in mentoring for K-12 students in Oklahoma.

The David and Molly Boren Mentoring Initiative promotes the growth and development of quality youth mentoring programs statewide. The initiative grew out of the Borens' own commitment to mentoring and the proven impact that mentoring can make on a student's success in and out of the classroom. The program provides on-call support and resources for mentoring organizations, school districts, community leaders, businesses and others seeking information on how to start or strengthen their mentoring program for K-12 students.

the Local Education Foundation Outreach Program has served more than 220 public school foundations statewide and has evolved to become the Oklahoma School Foundations Network.

The foundation's partnership with Colonial Williamsburg has also expanded as Stratton has nurtured connections with Teacher Institute alumni, Mount Vernon, the Oklahoma History Center and others to host Colonial Day at the State Capitol for Oklahoma fifth graders and to promote Colonial Day events in communities across the state.

Stratton has been especially passionate about expanding opportunities for teacher professional development. The foundation launched the Teacher Grants for Professional Development Program in 2003 to send teachers to top quality regional and national conferences. More than 830 teachers have received grants totaling \$1.1 million.

In 2006, Stratton led efforts to partner with the National Fund for Teachers to award grants of up to \$5,000 for individual teachers and \$10,000 for teams for self-designed summer professional development opportunities in locations around the world. Since then, more than 915 Oklahoma teachers have received grants totaling over \$3.2 million. Many have shared how their journeys changed the trajectory of their teaching practice and impacted their students and communities.

Stratton was recently honored as the Multicultural

Citizen of the Year in recognition of her leadership of a new online professional development platform for Teachers of English Learners. The pilot project – launched in 2019 – seeks to strengthen learning and improve retention rates of more than 60,000 Oklahoma students who do not speak English as their first language. Stratton has helped lead the program through its pilot phase and transfer to the State Department of Education, where it is now available to teachers statewide.

Stratton also played a critical role in the 2006 launch of our David and Molly Boren Mentoring Initiative, which encourages the growth and development of quality youth mentoring programs. This fall, the program is launching startup and opportunity grants to support mentoring programs serving K-12 students.

With Stratton at the helm, the foundation has received several honors including the 2003 Schusterman Award for Programming and Management Excellence, the 2009 Chapman Charitable Trusts Award in Education presented by the Oklahoma Center for Nonprofits and the 2010 Meritorious Service Award for Leadership in Education presented by the OU College of Education. In addition, Stratton was personally honored with the college's Meritorious Service Award in 2016.

OFE Academic Awards

The Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence is seeking nominations for its prestigious Academic All-State and Medal for Excellence Awards through an online portal at www.ofe.org.

Submissions for Academic All-State Awards, honoring 100 top public high school seniors, are due by 5 p.m. Thursday, Dec. 2. Nominations for Medal for Excellence Awards, which recognize five exceptional public school educators from elementary through collegiate levels, must be submitted by 5 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 30.

Awards totaling \$125,000 will be presented at the foundation's 36th Academic Awards Banquet on May 21, 2022, at the Omni Hotel in Oklahoma City and televised statewide on OETA.

Fund for Teachers Fellowships

Oklahoma teachers can apply now through Jan. 20, 2022, for Fund for Teachers Fellowships for self-designed, summer professional development experiences anywhere in the world.

Grants of up to \$5,000

for individuals and \$10,000 for teams of teachers are available for Oklahoma pre-K through 12th-grade teachers in public, private, parochial and charter schools. Applicants must have at least three years of teaching experience, be full-time employees and spend

50 percent or more of their time in a classroom setting.

In addition, applicants must have the intention of returning to their school and/or district following their summer professional development. School administrators are not eligible for the grants. To learn more, visit www.fundforteachers.org

While in Colonial Williamsburg, Oklahoma teachers will have the opportunity to meet character interpreters of 18th-century people and be immersed in early American history through hands-on activities and

reenactments of historic events. Applications must be submitted by Feb. 1, 2022, through the foundation website at www.ofe. org.

In October, we hosted virtual Fall Forum Wednesday Webinars on topics relevant to school foundation success. Our Theme This Year: Excelsior – Ever Upward!

For much of history, academic excellence was equated with the study of "the classics," and Latin was the lingua franca of the educated elite. The word "classics" is derived from the Latin adjective classicus, meaning "belonging to the highest class of citizens." In Oklahoma, the "highest class of citizens" in the realm of "academic excellence" very well may be our Academic All-Staters. Case in point? At a recent awards banquet, a former Academic All-Stater observed how rare - and refreshing! – it is to be among people who use the words alumnus, alumna, and alumni correctly!

If you need a refresher, don't feel bad! Recent surveys suggest that only 20% of K-12 students in the U.S. study any world language and, of those, only 2% study Latin. If you did study Latin, you know that an alumnus is a male graduate, and an alumna is a female graduate, of a particular school or program. Alumni is the plural form of alumnus but is commonly used in a gender-neutral way. To be truly all-inclusive (and avoid grammatical pitfalls), however, you may opt to use the "modernized" form of these words – alum and alums.

Modernization (evolution, progress, change...) is omnipresent in education. Hence, after Sputnik, Latin gave way to math and science. Some might even say that "academic excellence" is now equated with the study of STEM. Anecdotal evidence certainly suggests that Academic All-Staters are pursuing degrees and careers in STEM more than any other field. But, even as we

speak, STEM is going up in STEAM, as educators embrace research showing that experience in the fine arts boosts innovation and entrepreneurship.

Perhaps we can all agree that what matters most to the pursuit of "academic excellence" is heart, regardless of the

field of study. As Erin

We want our students to feel impassioned and empowered." Fittingly, then, our theme for this program year is EXCELSIOR!

Excelsior is Latin for "ever upward" and a favorite catch-phrase of our long-serving and much-beloved Executive Director Emily Stratton (and of comic book legend, Stan Lee). Emily retired this fall after 22 years of outstanding service to the foundation. CARPE DIEM, Emily – enjoy your well-earned retirement!

An online professional development platform for Teachers of English Learners created by the Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence has completed its pilot phase and is now open for teachers statewide on the Oklahoma State Department of Education Oklahoma EDGE website at https://osdeconnect.ok.gov.

As part of its Teacher Professional Development programs, the foundation created the Teachers of English Learners Pilot Project to address a critical need to build instructional capacity of classroom teachers on behalf of their English Learner students. The project uses a collaborative online learning platform to provide professional development, networking and support for classroom teachers in schools with high enrollment of English Learner students. The platform includes a free English-as-a-Second-Language (ESL) Certification Test Prep Course.

"Our ultimate goal was to provide an anytime, anyplace professional learning hub for classroom teachers committed to improving instruction for their English Learners," said Project Manager Lisa Pryor. "This goal was accomplished through

the curation of high-quality content and the ability for teachers to share information and network organically.'

When the foundation launched the platform in February 2020, the program was available to educators in 17 schools with approximately 360 registered teachers. Today, more than 800 Oklahoma educators from 95 districts have utilized the online platform. Organizers are hopeful that the number of teachers will increase exponentially with the new statewide access to the program.

"We are particularly pleased that the State Department of Education is taking on the operations of continuing and expanding these supports to Oklahoma educators," Pryor said. "We expect that this will translate to improved instruction for English Learners in classrooms across the

Thank You for the Opportunity of a Lifetime

Following are excerpts from Emily Stratton's farewell remarks as executive director, presented at the Annual Meeting of the Board of Trustees.

The past 22 years have truly been extraordinary for me. I have loved serving as executive director of the Oklahoma Foundation for Excellence. It has been a privilege to work for this organization and for all of you Thinking back over these past 22 years, I have so many wonderful memories and want to share a few.

My husband and I attended our first Academic Awards Banquet in 1987 in Oklahoma City since our daughter Paige was in the first class of Academic All-Staters. Sitting near the front of that giant ballroom, I remember thinking, "I have never been to a dinner with this many people!" There were 1,000 or more in attendance. Little did I know it would be the first of many Awards Banquets I would attend—helping to organize and enjoying them tremendously. They gave me many memories to cherish!

For example, in 2002, when Colonial Williamsburg Foundation President Colin Campbell was our keynote speaker, he surprised us and brought members of his Fife and Drum Corps. With flair, they led the grand march of the All-Staters into the ballroom. That grand march probably set an all-time record for audience and All-Stater goose bumps!

In 2010, Pulitzer Prize-winning author David McCullough gave an exceptionally inspiring keynote address. The following Monday, I emailed his daughter, who was my McCullough contact, to report on her dad's success. She said her whole family had dinner together that Sunday evening and that her parents enjoyed telling their children and

grandchildren about the remarkable students and teachers who were honored. Then she wrote, "We ended the evening...on the coast of Maine...with all of us singing 'Oklahoma!'" What a wonderful compliment for our event and for this foundation.

Thanks to the teamwork of trustees and staff, our programs and program expansions through the years have been well-designed and executed effectively, from Teacher Professional Development grants and Fund for Teachers partnerships to the Boren Mentoring Initiative and the English Learner Project. Likewise successful have been the expansion of existing programs, such as Colonial Day at the Capitol.


While attendance at the Academic Awards Celebration was limited and activities were modified to protect our guests, the celebration had many special touches – from giving parents the opportunity to present the

Gruwell shared the story of how she used literature to bring hope and healing to her inner-city students who had been labeled as "unteachable" because of their experiences with violence and poverty.

"I stand before you as an ordinary teacher who had extraordinary students who learned to put down a fist and a gun, who learned to pick up a pen and to face a fear, to pick up Inspired by teen diarists Anne Frank and Zlata Filipović, Gruwell's students discovered a new way to process their experiences through writing. The students' collective writings were printed by the same publishing house that released the "Diary of Anne Frank." Their work, "The Freedom Writers Diary" became a number-one best seller and inspired a feature film. Signed copies were presented to each of the Academic All-Staters.

In closing, Gruwell implored honorees to pick up a pen and "face a fear, tell a truth, stand up, speak up and speak out."
